amantha, twenty-six-year-old vivacious young woman, married a man who was in his late eighties. Her elderly husband recently died. Now Samantha is involved in a lawsuit with his adult children concerning the family inheritance. Samantha believes that since she was his lawful wife, she should be entitled to half of everything. On the other hand, the children's opinion is that she has no such entitlement. In fact, the children were not at all happy with their father's recent marriage. They felt that Samantha had manipulated their father into marriage. Therefore, the children filed legal motions to have the marriage annulled. The court, however, upheld the marriage—ruling that the father was of sound mind at the time. So, to Samantha's argument the marriage was legal.

Conversely, Samantha was not happy with the further findings of the court. The court argued that she was only entitled to what she and her husband accumulated during the marriage. Further, Samantha was not entitled to gifts left to the children in the last will and testament. The court suggested that the will was a promised agreement made by the children's father. Therefore, the will was a secured promise to the children that was validated by the father's signature. Items that the children were to receive from their father could not be touched, regardless of who he married. Needless to say, the children were ecstatic because there was nothing that could undo this contract.

Chapter Four - The Government of a Kingdom Agenda

ohn and Amy have been married for eleven years and have four children. The children's ages are 18, 17, 15, and 9. John is the biological father of the youngest child. As a mother rearing young children, Amy chose not to work outside the home. During the years after her first marriage and before her marriage to John, she received public assistance in the form of welfare and food stamps. Amy did not report her new marriage and continued to receive the assistance. Although John was against it, Amy often defended her actions by rationalizing that as long as the government made the funds available she would continue to apply for them. To make matters worse, Amy told the children that it was free money and she often used it to buy their affection.

As time passed, the arguments between John and Amy concerning the money grew, often involving the three oldest children. Amy wanted to continue receiving the welfare, but John was ready to put an end to the fraud before the government caught on to what they were doing. The three older children sided with their mother because they had become comfortable with the extra money.

Amy failed to see the effect this deception had on her marriage and on the attitudes of the children. When Amy suggested that the three teenagers get part-time jobs after school, they angrily refused and snapped back that she get a job. Amy then complained to John about the children disrespecting her. John suggested that Amy take a look in the mirror and accept her role in the current problems. He argued that they were both to blame. John explained that they had taught their children to be dependent on others instead of taking personal responsibility. He went on to say that they showed them how to cheat the government instead of productively contributing to society. As a result, John felt they had planted seeds that resulted in lazy children with no respect for authority.

arry was a devout Christian. He spoke of his convictions to his friends, coworkers, and family members. In fact, when he wasn't busy with his church work, Larry talked about his faith every chance that he had. One day Larry's co-worker asked for his help on a small project, but Larry refused because the time conflicted with his Bible study. Several days later, the same co-worker asked Larry to have lunch with him. Once more, Larry declined because he always met with his midday prayer group at lunchtime. Several more days passed and the coworker invited Larry for coffee after work. Larry turned down the invitation, explaining that he had to attend choir practice that evening. That day was the last time Larry saw his co-worker.

Sometime later, Larry received a letter from his co-worker. In the letter, the co-worker explained that he knew Larry was a Christian and had hoped

that Larry could help him deal with his troubled life. However, the co-worker said that each time he tried to set up some time to talk Larry was too busy. In the letter, the co-worker expressed feelings of hopelessness and confusion and told of his struggles with thoughts of suicide. As Larry read the letter he became sad, recalling the coworkers attempts to meet with him. At the end of the letter, the co-worker explained that Larry was his last hope. He wrote about the evening he went to the coffee shop alone and planned how he would end his life. As Larry read on, a lump formed in his throat and tears filled his eyes. Although Larry knew that it was the co-workers decision to commit suicide, he was devastated and felt guilty because he did not take the time to talk with him.



manda is 30-years-old and has two children ages three and four. She has been married to Ted for three years. Amanda and Ted both work full-time jobs, yet Ted earns considerably less than she does. In order to have the things that she wants for her family, Amanda feels that she must work overtime whenever possible. Ted repeatedly complains about her working so many hours. He loves serving the Lord through His church, but the increasing demands of leadership are beginning to take a toll on his time with his wife and children. Last week he had a home visit during the time of his daughter's music recital and a leaders' meeting conflicted with "date night" for him and his wife. Each time family outings are planned, it seems that leadership demands seem to overrule a previously made commitment. Now leadership meetings are scheduled during his work hours and there's no way he can leave work to attend the meeting designated as "mandatory". Chapter Twenty-Five - The Kingdom Agenda and Education



Ben Carson renowned neurosurgeon Johns **Hopkins** at Medical School. In several interviews, he has provided insight into how he reached the pinnacle of his profession. He credits his mother for stressing education. In fact, she required that he and his siblings read two books weekly and provide a written report for each. Ironically, he was unaware that his mother only possessed a third grade education and could not read his reports. However, his mother did not allow her lack of knowledge to interfere with her interest in her children's education. She also took the initiative in his spiritual development as well.

Dr. Carson credits both God and his mother for his achievements. He was an under achieving student until both of these entities came together and laid the foundation that took him to the top of his profession. Dr. Carson, in his humility, gives God the glory and does not boast in his achievements. He has made it a priority to keep God first in his life and strives to fulfill the calling that God has given him.
